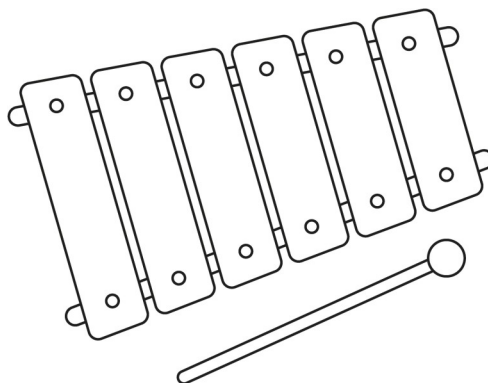




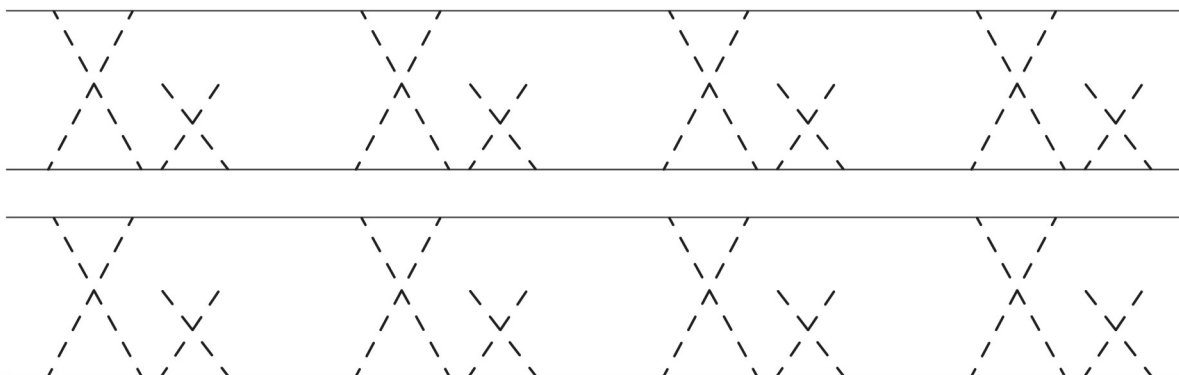

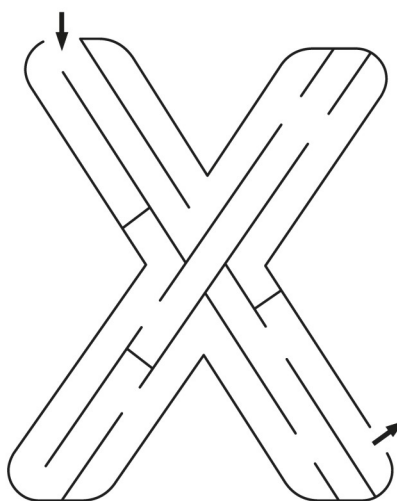

Without saying a single word?

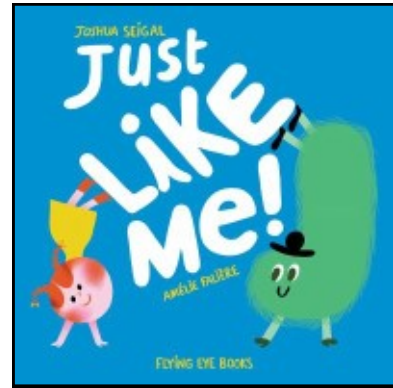
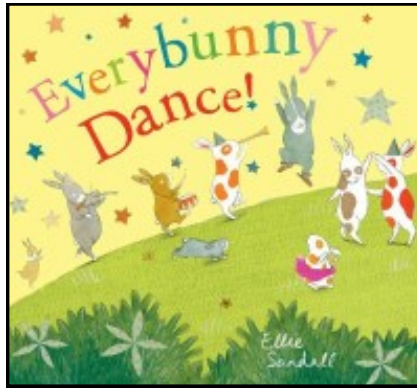

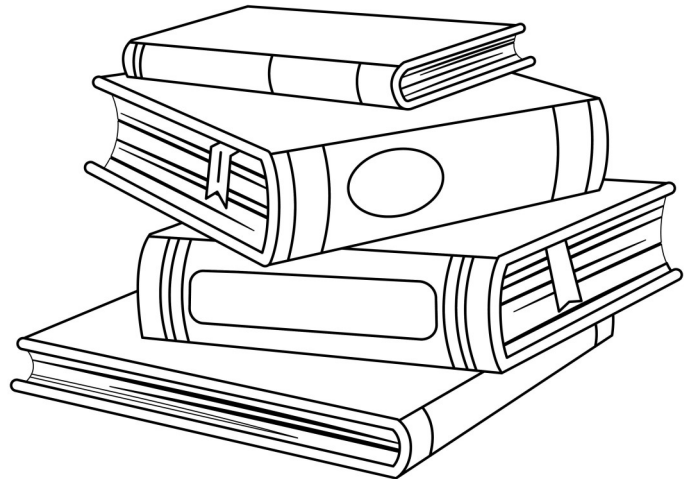
